—winter, spring class requests coming in

20 Extension Classes Concluding in 9 Communities

In cooperation with local vocational and adult schools and various local unions and central bodies, the School for Workers is completing its fall program of labor classes in nine different Wisconsin communities. Classes run for eight or nine weeks, meeting one night (or afternoon) per week.

Eleven classes are concluding in Milwaukee—two sections of a Stewards Training class with District 48, AFSCME; two sections of a Stewards class with Local 1111, United Electrical Workers; a Speech and Parliamentary Procedure class, one in Time Study and Wage Incentives, and one in Arbitration and the Grievance Procedure, all part of the general offerings at Milwaukee Vocational School; a two-section class in Introduction to Unionism with DALU 19806, Smith Steelworkers; and a two-section class in the Law of Collective Bargaining with Local 200 of the Teamsters.

Other communities in which fall classes have been held are: Ripon (Stewards Training), Superior (Interpreting and Enforcing the Collective Agreement), West Allis (Steward Training), Green Bay (Union Administration), Wausau

(Modern Wage and Salary Techniques), Waukesha (Building the Union), Beloit (Job Evaluation), and Cudahy (Contract Administration).

The winter classes will begin the first week in January and the schedule is filling up. Seven Milwaukee classes are already definite, with arrangements for several more still under discussion; the four general classes to be held at The Milwaukee Vocational School are listed on page 3 of this newsletter. Stewards Training will be offered at Stevens Point, and a class in Contract Negotiations will be held at Antigo. Other communities where union groups are considering classes are West Bend, Oshkosh, Sheboygan, Madison, Manitowoc, Green Bay and Two Rivers.

Class requests that cannot be fitted into the winter program may be scheduled for the spring session beginning the second week in March. Central labor bodies and locals throughout the state that have an interest in a class are urged to get in touch with the School for Workers as soon as possible, and to make a direct approach to the community's Vocational, Technical and Adult School as co-sponsor.
